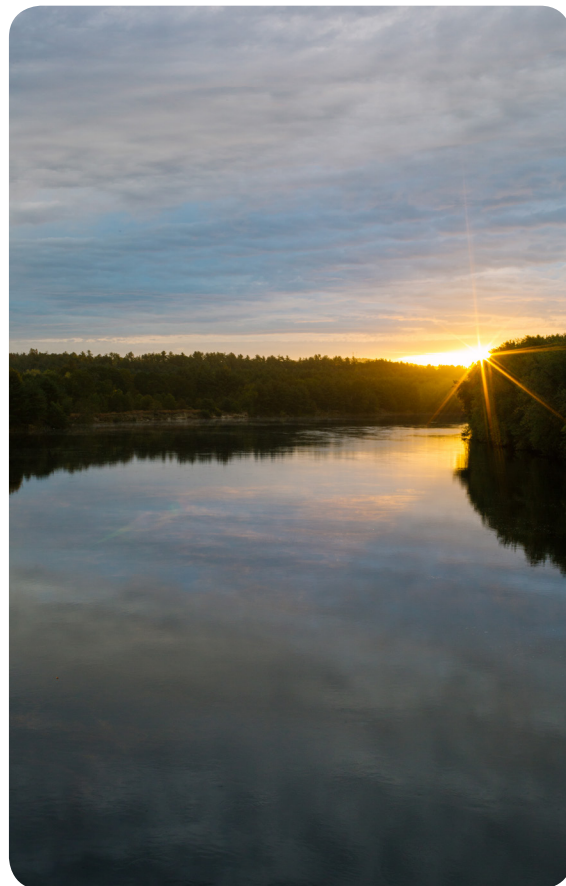


The Merrimack River stretches from New Hampshire to Massachusetts – thousands drive along it every day as it runs along our highways and under our bridges. But rapid development of forest lands, threats to water quality and the loss of habitat for at-risk species have led the U.S. Forest Service and the American Rivers Council to designate the Merrimack River as one of the most threatened rivers and watersheds in the nation.

“The Merrimack: River at Risk,” a documentary created by the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests (Forest Society), tells the story of the Merrimack River, diving deep into the reasons it is so critically important to the health and economic vitality of the region.

The film follows young conservationist Leah Hart as she meets business people, farmers, water works professionals, recreational users, history experts and other conservationists to learn the extensive reach of the Merrimack. Along the way, she learns why it is threatened and what can be done to alleviate the threat.
