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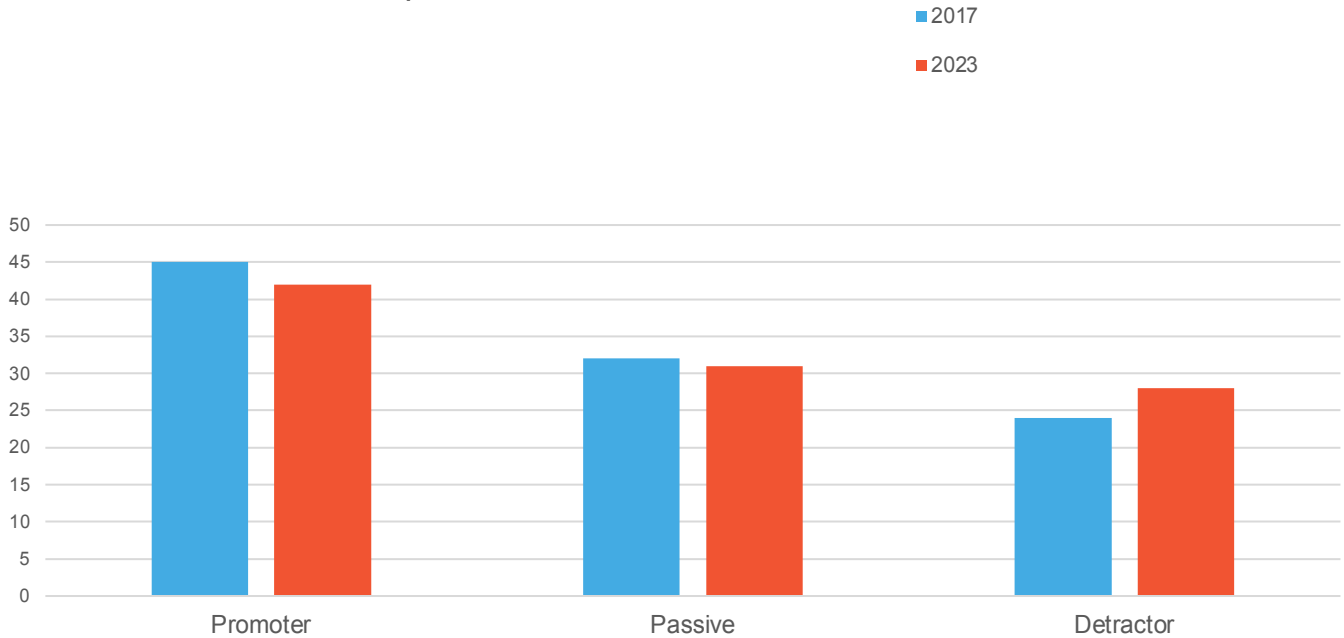
Survey Notes

These results are from a Saint Anselm College Survey Center poll based on online surveys of 417 New Hampshire residents aged 20 through 40. Surveys were collected between January 10th and 12th, 2023, from cell phone users randomly drawn from a sample of individuals reflecting the demographic characteristics of the target population. The survey has an overall margin of sampling error of +/- 4.8% with a confidence interval of 95%. Data are weighted for age, gender, geography, and education based on a demographic model derived from census and consumer data.

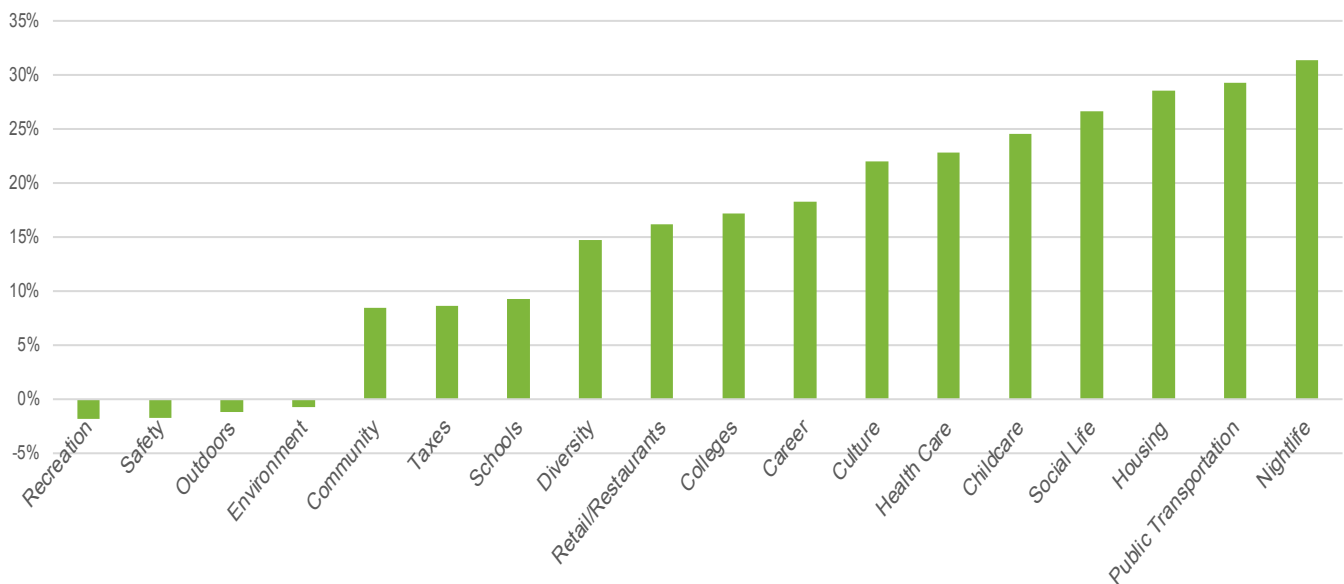
Key Findings

Residents' perception of New Hampshire's quality of life diminishes during their mid 20's through early 30's, but rebounds during their late 30's. 90% of those aged 36-40 are satisfied with their quality of life, followed by 82% of those aged 20-25. Only 71% of those aged 31-35 are satisfied. 77% of those aged 26-30 are satisfied.

Promoters have declined. Among residents aged 20-40, New Hampshire's desirability as a place to stay, work, and play has deteriorated somewhat since 2017, as reflected in a decline of promoters.

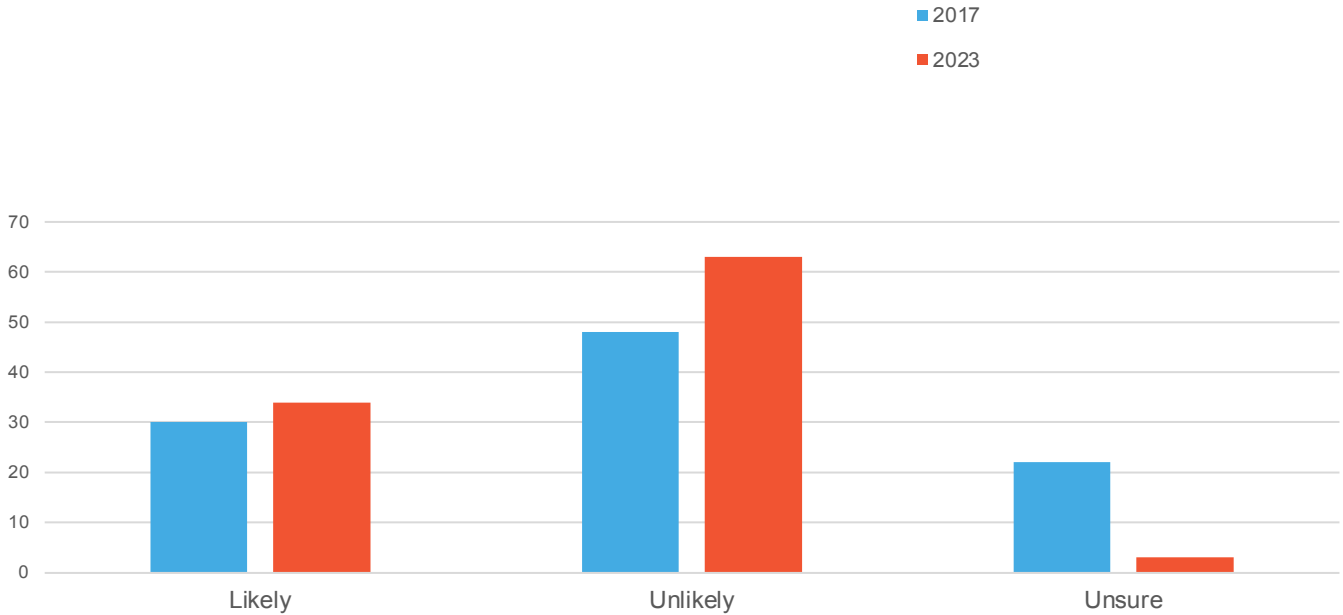


Key quality of life traits have declined. The decline in promoters reflects ground lost to other places to live in most key quality of life traits since 2017. New Hampshire gained only on its dominant traits.

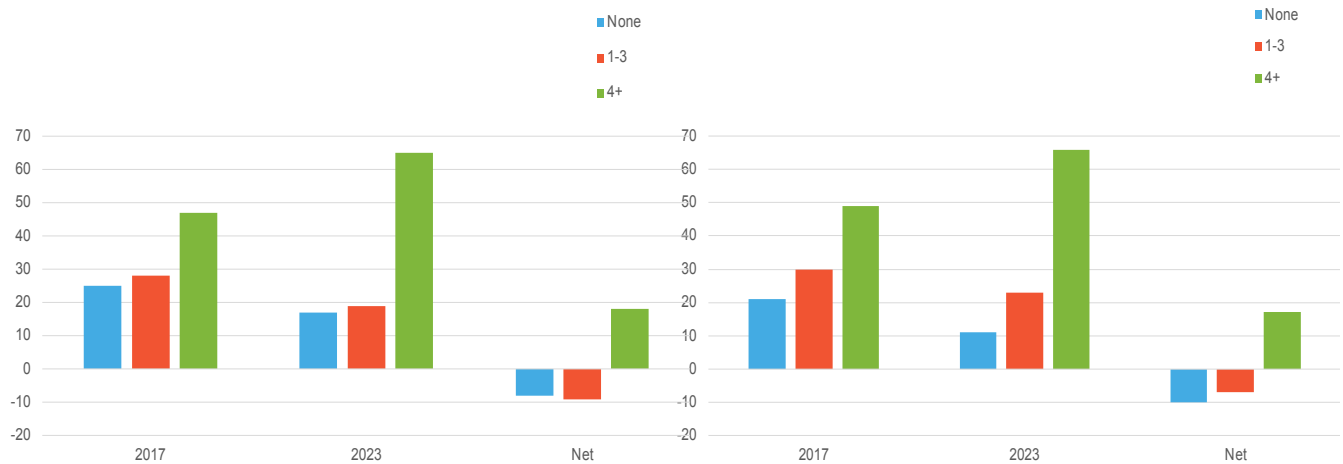
Stayers have increased. Although the percentage of respondents likely to move out of New Hampshire over the next two years has increased somewhat, the number of "unsure" respondents has decreased sharply as 63% overall are now committed to staying.

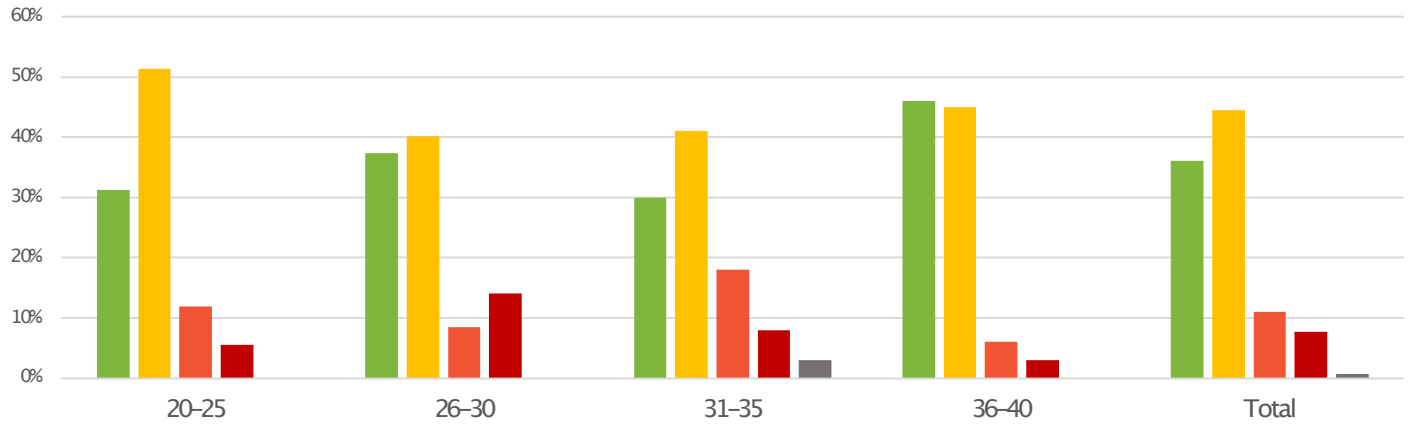

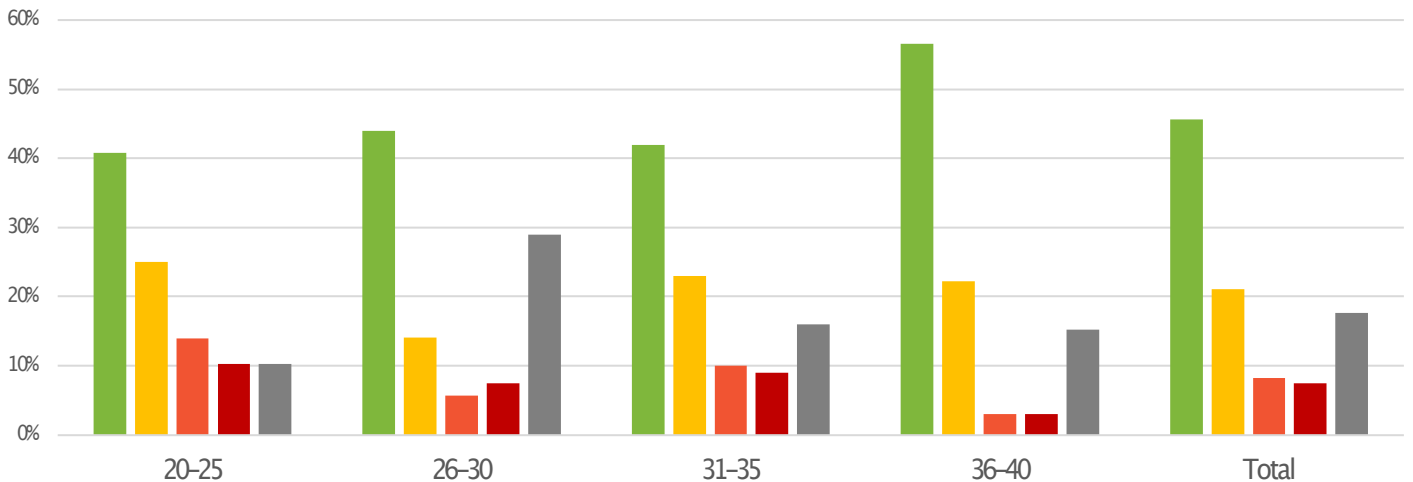
